


School of Rock: Movie Turned Broadway Hit

The 2003 film School of Rock starring Jack Black quickly became a beloved classic, captivating audiences with its infectious energy, hilarious performances, and rock 'n' roll spirit. However, the magic didn't stop there. In a truly remarkable transition, School of Rock made its way from the silver screen to the grand stage of Broadway, delivering a dynamic and electrifying musical adaptation that has captivated theatergoers around the world.

Directed by Richard Linklater, produced by Scott Rudin, and written by Mike White, the original film stars Jack Black, Joan Cusack, Mike White, and Sarah Silverman. As in the musical, the movie follows struggling rock guitarist Dewey Finn, who is fired from his band and subsequently poses as a substitute teacher at a prestigious prep school. After witnessing the musical talent of the students, Dewey forms a band of his students to attempt to win



the upcoming Battle of the Bands and use his winnings to pay his rent. The film received positive reviews from critics, with praise for Black's performance and humor. It was the highest-grossing music-themed comedy of all time until 2015.

Many rock music fans are familiar with the legacy of The Langley Schools Music Project, an acclaimed collection featuring children's choirs from the '70s singing covers of songs by Paul McCartney, David Bowie, the Beach Boys, and others, which was rereleased in 2001. As revealed in a 2003 interview with Jack Black, School of Rock screenwriter Mike White "loosely" based the film's script on the project, inspired by the concept of a teacher showing rock music to elementary schoolers. "I thought that was an amazing idea," Black said.

As in the musical production, all of the young performers played the instruments in the movie.

In April 2013, Andrew Llyod Webber purchased the stage rights to the film and began planning the musical adaptation. In December of 2015, the musical made its world premiere on Broadway. This would be the first time since Jesus Christ Superstar in 1971 that a Lloyd Webber musical would premiere on Broadway rather than in the West End. It would also mark a return for the composer to the Winter Garden Theatre, where his Cats ran for 18 years.
